This 2018/2019 was the 21st academic year for Chambers College. Our 16th graduating class, the Class of 2019, captured the essence of the Chambers College mission. We had two outstanding students graduate who dramatically different student profiles.

Hannah Chavez received her Associate of Arts of Christian Ministry degree, having done some work at Bob Jones University. She, however, preferred to finish at Chambers College. Her graduation came within days of her marriage to a fine man. Together they will do wonderful things for the Lord in church-based ministry, we feel certain.

Fellow graduate, Christina Smart, completed a degree that she had pursued years ago at a state university. Mrs. Smart is one of the best teachers with the Colorado Heritage Enrichment Academy, which has many cooperative arrangements with Chambers College. In completing her Bachelor of Arts degree, she concentrated on the philosophy and practice of teaching from a Biblical worldview.

She fulfilled the Chambers College mission of helping students to develop a lifelong love of learning based on the Bible's place in guiding all studies.

Both Chris and Hannah went on the London Study Tour in 2018. The crest designed by the graduating class of 2019 features references to England and the importance of Biblical Languages. Their class motto is, "Trust God."

First Worship Conference a Success

An all-day conference was held Saturday, May 18th, co-sponsored by Reformation Baptist Church and Chambers College. The theme of the conference was "Christ and the Cross in Worship."

The speakers were Pastor Jesse Hill, minister of Rock Creek Bible Church, Maxwell, Iowa; Pastor Jason Parker, minister of High Country Baptist Church, Colorado Springs; Pastor Stan Lightfoot, minister of Rustic Hills Baptist Church also in Colorado Springs; and, from the UK, Pastor David Kay, minister of Whiddon Valley Evangelical Church, Barnstaple who is a Trustee of the Christian Worship Publishing Trust. Pastor Steve Ong was the moderator.

The sessions covered different aspects of conservative, reverent worship of Almighty God

and highlighted the errors and aberrations of contemporary practices II found i n many 🎆 evangelical churches, here and abroad. Pastor began Hill the conference and spoke on "Prayer in presenting Christ and the Cross in Worship"; followed by Pastor David Kay, who

announced a call to the "Old Paths to present Christ and the Cross in Worship," quoting Jeremiah 6 v 16, pointing out that Contemporary worship methods and Contemporary Christian Music have no warrant in scripture.

Stan Lightfoot, who has been studying the role of music styles in worship as part of his doctoral program, spoke on the necessity of using reverent music to achieve reverent Christ-centered worship.

Jason Parker followed up with how centering on Christ and the Cross should inform all of our methodological choices in the church.

His message was highly intellectual as well as spiritual as he addressed the importance of proper methodlolgies

Jesse Hill closed the conference with a message on the necessity for addressing worship practices with a spirit of humility. The conference also included a question and answer session, a luncheon and afternoon tea, as well as robust singing of Psalms and hymns in each session.

This year's speakers and attendees are interested in communicating with each other throughout the year, and there are preliminary plans for another conference in the future.

Chambers College Formal Dinner

The spring semester formal dinner and table talk was held in February. Students, alumni, staff and friends of the college all enjoyed the fine menu and the opportunity to connect with members of our college community.

Pastor Ong chose to speak on the educational impact of the Pilgrim Fathers during the years before they set sail in the *Mayflower*. John Robinson and the other leaders of the congregation which took refuge in Leyden before coming to America, were highly educated and influential spiritual men. Robinson was even chosen to speak on behalf of the Calvinistic viewpoint at the Council of Dordt, during the sojourn in Holland, even though he was the pastor of an English congregation. The Pilgrim Fathers were well prepared as spiritual and civic leaders for the enormous task God called them to do in establishing a beacon of religious freedom for the world.

Pastor Ong's talk was based on preliminary research for a writing project that will look at the legacy of the Pilgrims in honor of the 400th anniversary of their sailing (1620-2020).

The musical theme for each movement is based on a work by a composer who lived and wrote at the same time in history as the Pilgrims.


The Kadlub Scholarship program is open to






